Items to Look for Outside Your Home

How Can This Help Protect My Home From Flooding?

1. Storm Drain



Put an 'x' if you find a storm drain that is it blocked with things such as leaves, snow or garbage.



Put a '*' if you find a storm
drainthat isifiyeouffond alsologis
like this picture.

Storm drains that are free of all debris allow water to drain quickly from the street and reduce flood risk.

2. Eaves Troughs



Put an 'x' if it is clogged with leaves, seedlings, etc.



Put a '\varphi' if it looks like there are no items blocking the flow of water.

Clogged eaves troughs can cause water to overflow beside the home, increasing flood risk.

3. Downspouts



Put an '*' if the downspout deposits water right at the side of the house like this.



Put a '*' if the downspout deposits water about 2 metres away from the side of the house or to a low point in between houses that carries water away from the home.

Downspouts that deposit right at the side of a house increases the risk that the water will seep into the basement. Having downspouts that deposit water 2 metres away from the side of the house or to a low point in between houses that carries water away from the home helps to keep your home dry and reduces the risk of flooding.





4. Rain Barrels




Put an * if the rain barrel pours everywhere when it is full because it does not have a way to direct water at least 2 metres away from the house.



Put a 'V' if the rain barrel has a way to direct water at least 2 metres away from the house when it is full (e.g. with overflow pipes or connections to other rain barrels) or if water flow is blocked to the rain barrel when it is full and sent back into the downspout using a diverter (as shown in the photo).

Rain barrels are a great way to store rainwater but if it doesn't have a way to direct water safely away from the house when it is full it can increase the risk of flooding.

5. Window Wells



Put an '*' if your window wells sit lower than 10-15 centimetres above the ground.



Put a '*' if your window wells sit at least than 10-15 centimetres above the ground. Bonus points if you find window well covers.

Window wells that sit lower than 10-15 centimetres above the ground can't keep water away from low windows during rainstorms.

6. Landscaping



Put an '♥' if you have lawn and gardens.



Put an additional '✓' if you have trees and shrubs

Trees and shrubs can help soak up extra water from rainstorms and melting snow and ice.

7. Stored Items




Put an 🛪 if items in your basement garage are on the floor and can easily get wet if there's a flood.



Put a '✔' if items are stored safely. This could include placing valuable items in plastic containers on a shelf (like the picture) or moving them out of your basement or garage.

Items stored in places like garages and basements are at a higher risk of being damaged by floods. Keeping your valuables protected by placing them in plastic bins or up on a shelf is a great way to keep them safe.

8. Floor Drains



Put an 💥 if your floor drain is blocked Put a 💞 if your floor drain is clear by household items.



and not blocked by household items.

A clear drain removes water from your floor quickly, minimizing any flood damage.

9. Sump Pump



Put an 'x' if you have a sump pump that has never been tested.



Put a 'v' if your sump pump has been tested every spring and fall.

Sump pits collect water from pipes underground around the outside of your home. Sump pumps take the water out of your sump pit and pump it away from your house. Sump pumps should be tested every spring and fall to make sure they are working when they are needed.

10. Flood Alarm



Put an 'X' if your flood alarm has no flood alarm.



Put a '✔' if your home has a flood alarm.

Flood alarms that have been tested every spring and fall will detect leaks and floods as soon as possible so your family can take action to protect your home.

11. Backwater Valve



Put an 'X' if your backwater valve is in need of being cleared and tested.



Put a '*' if your backwater valve is cleared and tested every spring and fall.

Cleaned backwater valves will ensure it is working when it is needed to protect your home from flooding.
